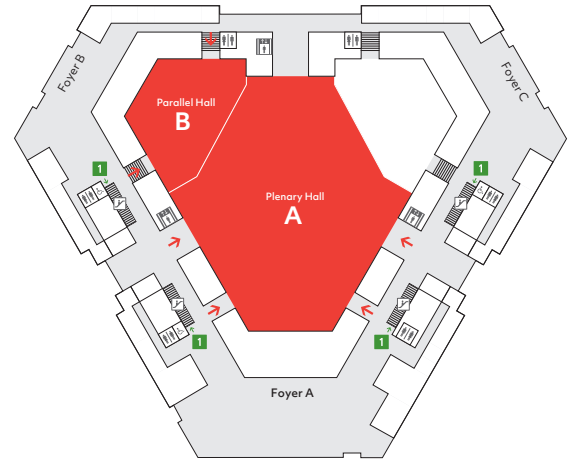

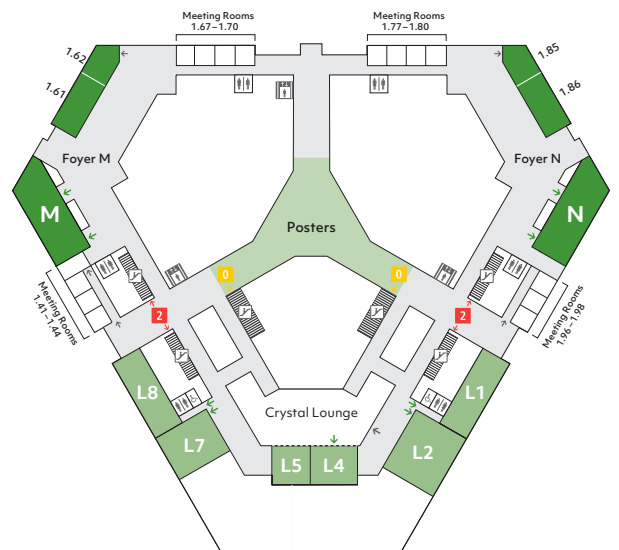

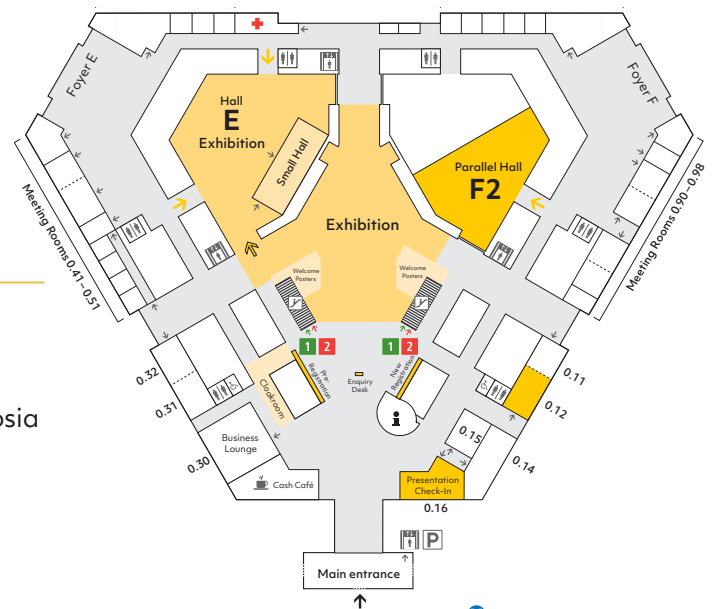

Keynote Speakers



Quentin Denost

Quentin Denost is a Professor of Colorectal Surgery at Bordeaux University Hospital, France.

He has recently been appointed as Professor in the colorectal surgery unit of Bordeaux University Hospital in which he was an Assistant Professor from 2016. His clinical and research activities are both focused on colorectal cancer and inflammatory bowel disease. He was clinical and research fellow from 2011 to 2014 in Bordeaux University Hospital in the team of Eric Rullier before moving abroad in 2015 to Sydney (Professor Michael Solomon - Royal Prince Alfred Hospital) and London (Professor Paris Tekkis - Royal Marsden Hospital).

He passed his Ph.D. into healing process and colorectal tissue engineering in 2014. His publications are mainly focused on advanced rectal cancer, sphincter-saving surgery, locally recurrent rectal cancer and laparoscopic surgery. He is an active member of the French GRECCAR group.



Roel Hompes

Roel Hompes is a Colorectal Surgeon at the Academic Medical Center Amsterdam.

Roel Hompes holds an MD degree from the Catholic University of Leuven and a PhD from the University of Amsterdam. He has undergone extensive training in the field of Coloproctology and completed his postgraduate training in renowned Colorectal and IBD expert centres including Leuven in Belgium and Basingstoke and Oxford in the UK.

From 2013 until 2017 he worked as a Consultant at the Department of Colorectal Surgery in Oxford with a specialist interest in minimal invasive rectal cancer management, pelvic floor disorders and IBD. Since October 2017, he has worked in the Surgical Division of the Department of Lower GI Surgery at Amsterdam UMC.

He is a member of the ESCP Education Committee and ESCP Representative in ESSAT. His main research interest involves surgical innovation, management strategies for rectal cancer and, in particular low rectal cancer, management of pelvic sepsis and fluorescent guided surgery.

Keynote Speakers



Tonia Young-Fadok

Tonia M. Young-Fadok is Professor of Surgery at Mayo Clinic, Arizona, USA.

She is past chair of the Division of Colon and Rectal Surgery and is Program Director of the Minimally Invasive Colorectal Surgery Fellowship. She is past president of the International Society of Digestive Surgery and founding President of ERAS (Enhanced Recovery after Surgery) USA.

She attended Oxford University Medical School and then moved to the USA, where she was first a Harvard University Research Fellow. This was followed by surgical residency at St. Elizabeth's Medical Center in Boston and a fellowship in colon and rectal surgery at Mayo Clinic, Rochester, MN, USA, where she was subsequently on staff. This was followed by a move to the warmer climes of Mayo Clinic in Phoenix, AZ.

Her clinical interests have focused on the dissemination of laparoscopic skills, particularly in more complex colorectal cases in cancer and IBD, and in the translation of enhanced recovery evidence into clinical practice.



Des Winter

Professor Des Winter is a Consultant Surgeon at St Vincent's University Hospital, Dublin.

A graduate of the National University of Ireland (Dublin), Des completed cellular physiology research spanning Ireland and Yale University for a doctorate of medicine by thesis before completing higher surgical training.

He received the ASGBI gold medal for the Intercollegiate Fellowship examination and was appointed as consultant surgeon to his alma mater, St Vincent's University Hospital (Dublin) but deferred commencement to complete a fellowship at the Mayo Clinic (Rochester).

Des is an editor of BJS, a research enthusiast, and is the current chair of the ESCP programme committee.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT

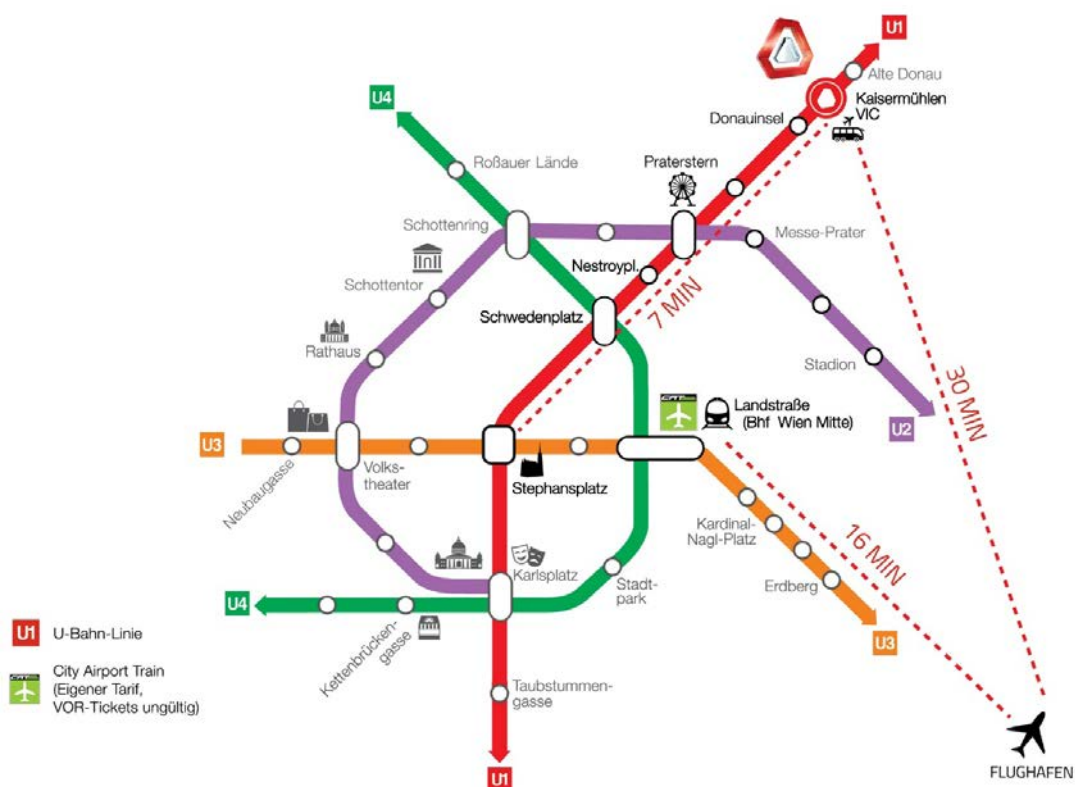
TRAVEL BETWEEN AIRPORT AND CITY

City Airport Train (CAT): connects the airport with the transport hub "Landstraße" at Wien Mitte in only 16 minutes and offers numerous additional services such as the City Check-In with baggage drop.

Trains: Vienna Hauptbahnhof is Vienna's central hub station for all international trains and ÖBB domestic mainline trains. Several trains and commuter trains run from Vienna Airport to the city centre, namely the Intercity Express (ICE), and the S-Bahn S7. Each has their own timetable and ticket price, but the average trip will cost from €5 and will take 30 – 37 minutes.

City Airport Taxi: taxis are available from Vienna Airport to the city centre and will take 20 – 25 minutes. Available 24hrs and costs approximately €35 – 40.

City Airport Bus: Vienna Airport bus is the cheapest way to get to the city. From the airport, you can take the express shuttle Vienna Airport Lines. Buses run once every 30 minutes from 06:00 – 00:30 and the average ticket cost is €8. The journey takes approximately 40 minutes.

Visited: American Society of Colon & Rectal Surgeons 2019 Annual Scientific Meeting, Cleveland, Ohio

After being selected for the best research paper award at the ESCP conference in 2018 I had the privilege to visit the ASCRS Annual Scientific Meeting in Cleveland in June 2019. Since I have a special interest in Inflammatory Bowel Diseases, I also attended the Cleveland Clinical IBD Master Class one day prior to the ASCRS conference. This was a great opportunity for me to have a look around at the Cleveland Clinic Main Campus and meet IBD experts from all over the world. After this educational masterclass the actual conference started. On the first day the ASCRS had organised a Young Surgeons Reception in the Hilton Cleveland Downtown hotel where I stayed. Here I met many international colleagues, and some of them were attending the Young Surgeons Committee Meeting the next morning too where I was invited to briefly present my paper. The committee members were really welcoming, and we had a nice discussion after my presentation. During the following days I attended many workshops and presentations in the Huntington Convention Center, including two interesting workshops about Question Writing and Critical Review of Scientific Manuscripts. The presentations at the conference were of high quality and both subjects on colorectal surgery as work related topics such as work-life balance and leadership were debated. The presentation went very well with positive reactions from the audience, and some of the surgeons even considered to offer an appendectomy as therapy for ulcerative colitis in their own hospitals. I am very grateful to the ESCP for the opportunity to visit the ASCRS conference and present my paper there.

Visited: Barts Health NHS Trust (the Royal London Hospital and Whipps Cross University Hospital), London, UK, under the direction of Mr Pasquale Giordano

I had the great pleasure of being awarded a three-month ESCP fellowship (April-June 2019) at the colorectal and pelvic floor surgery department at Barts Health NHS Trust in the Royal London Hospital and Whipps Cross University Hospital under the direction of Mr Pasquale Giordano (Consultant Colorectal Surgeon and Clinical Lead). I choose this unit because it is a tertiary referral centre for pelvic floor disorders while also being a high-volume centre for all types of colorectal diseases, from colorectal cancer to inflammatory bowel disease.

This hands-on clinical fellowship in the field of colorectal and pelvic floor surgery provided me lots

of opportunity to participate in pelvic floor surgery, cancer and IBD surgery, the treatment of perianal diseases, and complex abdominal wall reconstruction. I developed specific skills in THD, intersphincteric implants, anorectal flaps, fistula treatments and posterior compartment separation technique for abdominal wall reconstruction and the correction of parastomal hernias.

I improved my knowledge and skills in anorectal physiology, including high-resolution manometry, 3D endoanal ultrasound, colonic transition studies and dynamic defecography. I participated in specialised clinics for pelvic floor disorders, SNS, neurogastroenterology/motility disorders resulting in constipation, faecal incontinence and other functional problems. I had an active role in the weekly pelvic floor multi-disciplinary discussions, which gave me the opportunity to learn more about management and decision-making for multiple complex pelvic floor problems.

This fellowship provided me the opportunity to develop academically; I participated in research projects on anorectal physiology and treatments for faecal incontinence, which led to a manuscript, and the possibility to present a case and some of the research results at the next ESCP meeting. During my time in London I attended multiple scientific meetings such as the Queen Mary University Neuro-gastroenterology course, ACPGBI chapter meeting, St Marks benign proctology days, Whipps Cross University Hospital Higher Surgery Course, THD training course, European Abdominal Wall Repair MasterClass, Whipps Cross Hospital and the CARES Complex Abdominal Reconstructions Experts Symposium and international live surgery workshop.

In general, this clinical fellowship provided me with an excellent opportunity to improve my surgical skills and clinical knowledge in pelvic floor surgery, perianal diseases and abdominal wall surgery. I am very grateful to ESCP, Medtronic and my colleagues in the Haaglanden Medisch Centrum for affording me this fellowship opportunity. I would like to express my sincere gratitude to Mr Pasquale Giordano, Professor Charles Knowles, all consultant surgeons, fellows, registrars, nurses and the fantastic colorectal team at Barts Health NHS Trust.

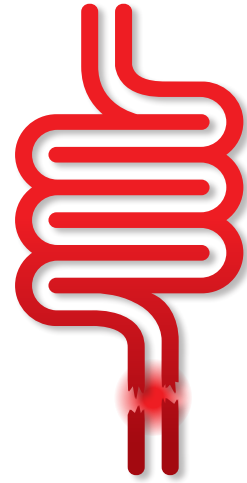

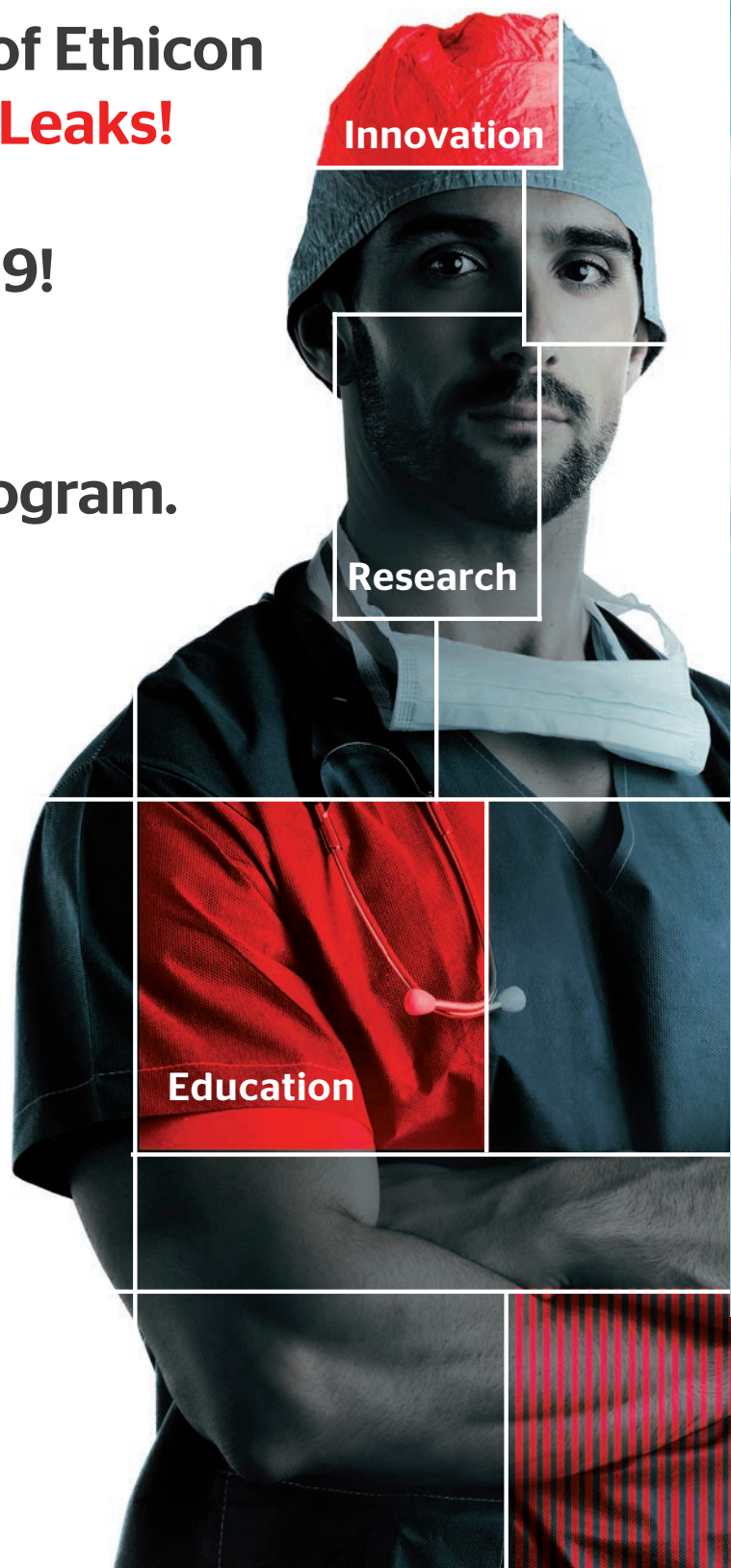
