- founded in 1958 to foster the interests of specialists in all medical disciplines
- representation from National Associations from the European Union (EU) member states and others, including Norway and Switzerland
- Armenia, Israel, Turkey are associated members and Georgia is an observer member



UEMS: AIMS

- To study and promote the highest level of training of the medical specialists, practice and health care in the European Union
- To study and promote a free movement of specialist doctors within the EU
- To represent within this framework of a medical profession in the EU member states authorities with questions directly/indirectly concerning medical profession



UEMS

- 1962 the UEMS identified sections representing the principal specialties, e.g. Section of Surgery, representing General Surgery
- Section developed two main strategies:
- creation of accreditation and certification in General Surgery: formation of the European Board of Surgery (EBS),
- developed an accreditation and certification diploma in General Surgery: European Board of Surgery Qualification (EBSQ Gen).



UEMS

 the differentiation of General Surgery into its constituent specialties: There are now several of these: Division within the Section

1996: Vascular Surgery: EBSQ (Vascular) Diploma

1998: Division Coloproctology

 today the UEMS consists of 42 Specialist Sections, 10 Multidisciplinary Joint Committees and over 20 Divisions

 the Division of Coloproctology commenced in 1998 and established accreditation and certification in Coloproctology in Europe





EBSQ

- diploma as such is not yet officially recognized on a national level as the specialist examination for Coloproctology
- in several countries the diploma has gained professional acceptance and value



Germany the Diploma is accepted as an equivalent to the German qualification as Visceral Surgeon as a prerequisite to be accepted as Centre of Competence/Excellence in Colorectal Surgery



Swedish accreditation of Coloproctology has been used the EBSQ Examination since 2006
