



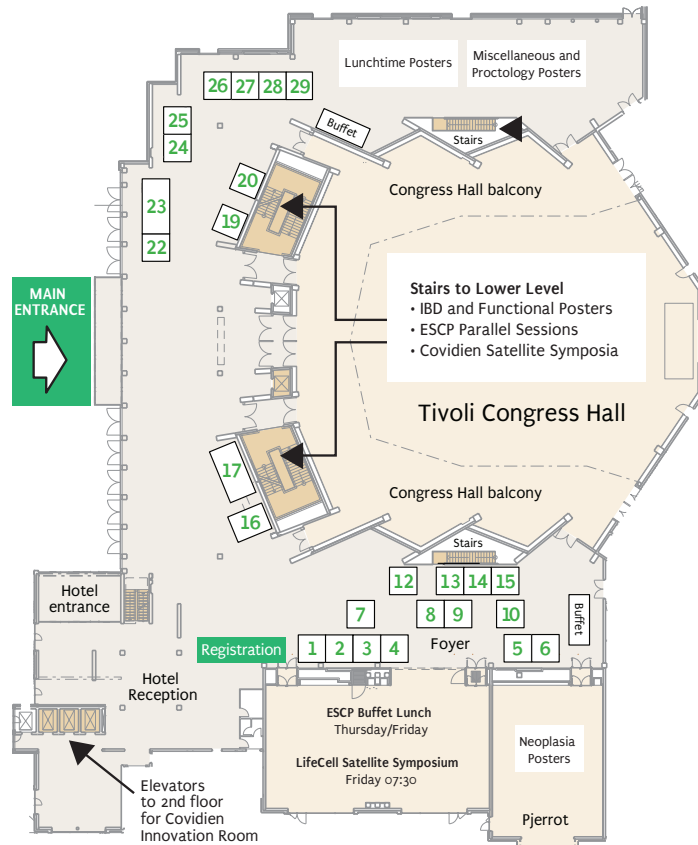

Keynote Speakers



Sergey Achkasov

Sergey Achkasov, Head of Department of Colon Surgery of the State Scientific Center of Coloproctology (Moscow) was born in 1962.

He has special interests in laparoscopic surgery for colorectal cancer, diverticular disease, colostomy closure, constipation and colon abnormalities. He has published 154 papers, 7 patented inventions and is co-author of the manual "Basics of Coloproctology" and the book "Hirsprung's Disease".

Sergey is a Scientific Head of the Russian Stoma Care Association, a representative of the Russian Association of Coloproctology in the ESCP, a member of the ISUCRS and of the editorial board of the Russian journal "Coloproctology".



Laurent Beaugerie

Laurent Beaugerie is Professor of Gastroenterology at Saint-Antoine Hospital, Pierre et Marie Curie Paris-6 University, Paris, France, a member of the AGA, and one of the two National Representatives of France in ECCO.

Professor Beaugerie completed his medical degree at Tours University and his fellowship at the Saint-Antoine hospital.

He has researched the mechanisms and regulation of intestinal transport of passively-absorbed monosaccharides, for which he obtained a PhD. He was also involved at this time in clinical research on intestinal complications of HIV-infection, *Clostridium difficile* diarrhoea and colitis in immunocompetent adults, and drug-induced microscopic colitis.

He initiated and coordinated the French observational CESAME cohort, which aims to better understand and prevent all cancers related to IBD and/or to immunosuppressive treatments. With the Saint-Antoine tertiary care centre team, he is engaged in clinical research on natural history and complications of IBD. He is currently compiling data from this research and from efficacy and safety parameters of treatments to optimise management strategies for IBD.



Bruno Cola

Bruno Cola graduated in General Surgery at the Bologna University in 1975. He is full Professor of Surgery at the Bologna University Medical School and Chairman of the Department of General Surgery of the S.Orsola Bologna University Hospital.

He is a Past President of the Italian Society of Coloproctology, a Past President of the European Council of Coloproctology and a member of many national and international Scientific Societies. His clinical and scientific interest mainly concerns colorectal surgery with regard to oncologic, inflammatory and functional diseases. His Surgical Unit is also involved in epato-biliary and bariatric surgery.

He is author of 350 publications including articles on national and international journals, chapters of treatises and monographies.



Jørn Dalsgaard Nielsen

Jørn Dalsgaard Nielsen is head of the Thrombosis & Haemostasis Unit at Rigshospitalet, Copenhagen University Hospital. He earned his M.D. degree from Copenhagen University School of Medicine.

After completing his general medical training, he received his fellowship at Hvidovre University Hospital in Copenhagen and specialized in internal medicine and haematology. His main interests are: disseminated intravascular coagulation and prevention and treatment of thromboembolic disorders. He has authored or co-authored over 100 publications and delivered over 200 national and international presentations.

Dr. Nielsen is a member of a number of medical societies and Past President of the Danish Society on Thrombosis and Haemostasis. He currently serves as co-chairman of the Scientific Subcommittee on DIC of the International Society on Thrombosis and Haemostasis.



Steven Wexner

Steven Wexner is the Chief Academic Officer at Cleveland Clinic Florida, Professor and Associate Dean at Florida Atlantic University and Professor and Affiliate Dean at Florida International University.

He was awarded an FRCS from the Royal College of Surgeons in Edinburgh and an FRCS by unanimous election of the Council of the Royal College of Surgeons of England, the highest distinction conferred by the Council. He is President of the American Society of Colon and Rectal Surgeons, President of the American Board of Colon and Rectal Surgery, and Past President of the Society of American Gastrointestinal and Endoscopic Surgeons.

He is an honorary member of the surgical societies of nine other countries. He has published over 500 manuscripts, 200 textbook chapters, and 100 editorial and invited commentaries, and has edited 25 textbooks; he is a member of 30 editorial boards.

You will find that the days fly past quickly in Copenhagen, since there is so much to do.

Spend a day having a blast at the extremely popular Tivoli Amusement

Park, which is home to the historic wooden roller coaster Rutschebanen and situated in the very centre of Copenhagen. Alternatively, board a canal boat and enjoy a tour of the scenic waterfront, spend an afternoon enjoying a chilled Danish beer outside one of the main bars lining the Nyhavn Canal, or go

shopping along the Stroget, which is known for being the longest pedestrian mall anywhere in the entire world.

Try to make time to simply stroll around central Copenhagen and soak up the atmosphere, looking out for local landmarks, such as the Christiansborg Slot (Christiansborg Castle) and the Borsen (Stock Exchange), both of which reside on the Christiansborg Slotsplads. Close by and dominating the Town Hall Square itself (Rådhuspladsen), the Københavns Rådhus (Copenhagen City Hall) is easily spotted by its distinctive clock tower. However, few Danish landmarks come more famous than the Den Lille Havfrue (Little Mermaid), a rather small bronze statue next to the harbour front, celebrating the famous mermaid character created by Hans Christian Andersen and later immortalised by Disney.

A number of truly world-class museums reside within the city of Copenhagen, such as the Carlsberg Museet (Carlsberg Museum), where you can enjoy guided tours of a working brewery before sampling the actual produce at the end. The Nationalmuseet (National Museum) is another gem and was established as far back as 1807 and contains many priceless Danish treasures and an interesting exhibition remembering the Viking Age. If art galleries are more to your taste, then Copenhagen will not disappoint, with highlights including the Malerisamlingen Ordrupgard (Museum of Modern Art), the Statens Museum for Kunst (State Museum of Art), and also the Royal Danish Academy of Art, located within the magnificent Charlottenborg Palace and filled with Danish masterpieces.

In the unlikely event that Copenhagen only serves to whet your appetite and you crave more of Denmark, then close by are many notable tourist attractions. Next to the Oresund Strait (the 'Sound'), Charlottenlund is a wealthy and engaging suburb, with a sandy beach and remains of a historic castle (Charlottenlund Fort). Day trippers from Copenhagen will also enjoy spending time around Amager Island and the waterfront of Dragor, relaxing on Bellevue Beach at nearby Klampenborg, visiting the vibrant town of Frederiksberg, or zooming around on the fast roller coasters at the Bakken Amusement Park, within the Dyrehaven Deertpark area.

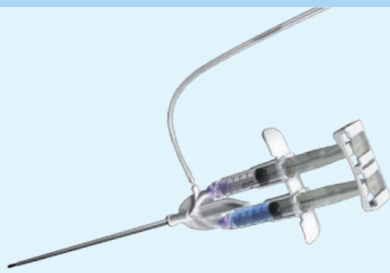

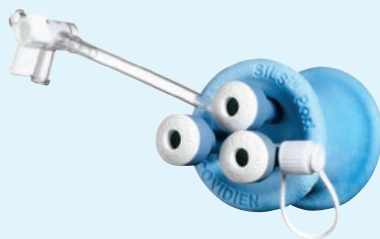

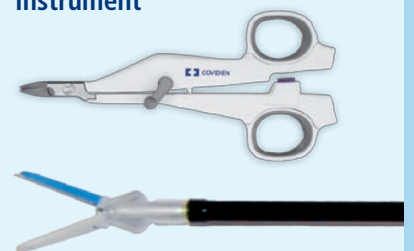
