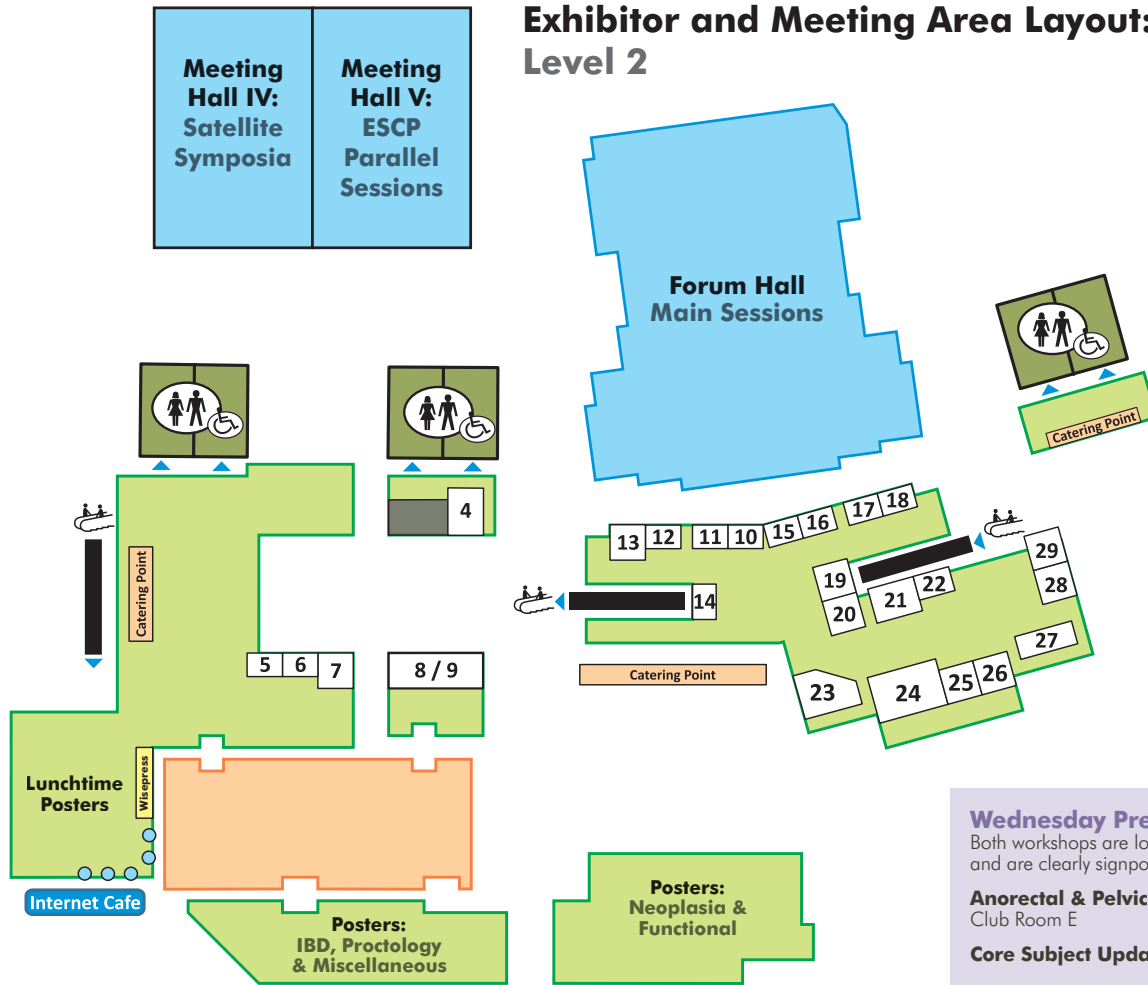

A-Z OF GENERAL INFORMATION ABSTRACTS

Posters: posters are divided across five areas which are:

Neoplasia, Functional, IBC, Proctology and Miscellaneous

Posters are all located on the exhibition level, and are sign-posted.

ESCP will award a prize of €500 for the best of the Six Best Papers and a prize of €300 for the best Lunchtime Poster. These prizes will be presented on Saturday at the close of the meeting.

ACCOMPANYING PERSONS

The Accompanying Persons' registration fee covers attendance to the welcome reception on Thursday evening and a walking tour of Prague on Thursday (including lunch) departing at 10:00 from the Prague Congress Centre.

BADGES AND TICKETS

Delegates are asked to wear name badges at all times during the Congress. Accompanying Persons are also asked to wear their name badge when attending the Welcome Reception on Thursday evening. Tickets are required for the Congress dinner on Friday evening, and for all arranged tours, and must be presented at the time of departure.

BANKS AND CURRENCY

Banks: most banks are open weekdays from 8.30 - 17:00. They are generally closed for 1 hour at lunchtime (12:00 - 13:00) and all day on Saturday and Sunday. At other times, money can be exchanged at the airport and at most hotels. Komerční Bank has a branch inside the Prague Congress Centre which is located between entrances 5 (ESCP) and 6 (telephone +420 (0)241 412 011).

Currency: the official currency of the Czech Republic is the Czech crown (**koruna**), with the international abbreviation CZK. The approximate value of 100 CZK is €4 EUR/5 USD. As the official currency, the Czech crown is the best and often the only possible currency to use when paying. Although the Czech Republic is part of the European Union, the euro is not widely accepted here yet. Some stores, restaurants and hotels accept payments in Euros but exchange rates may be poor.

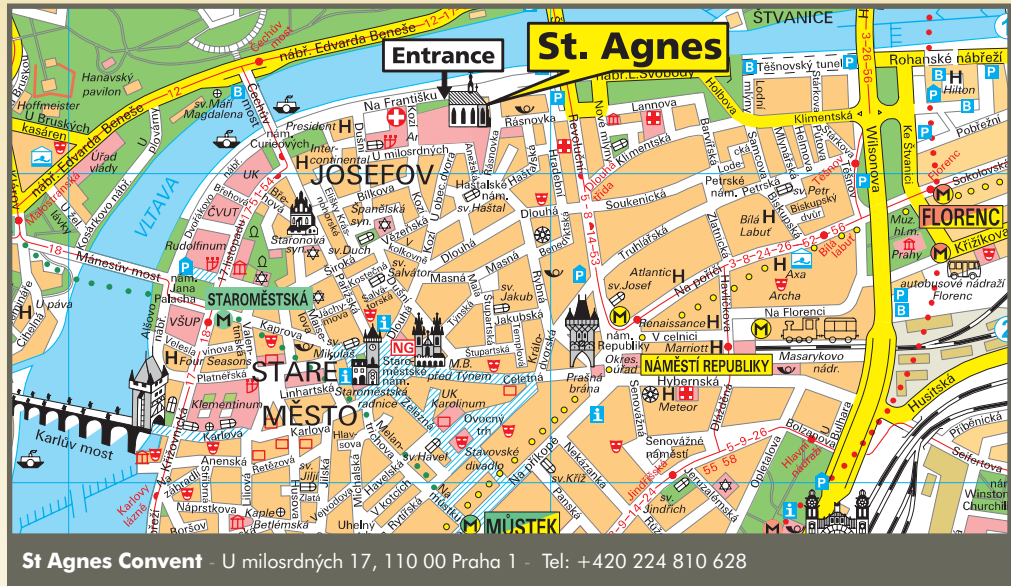

LANGUAGE

The official Congress language is English, there are no translation services available at the meeting this year.

Messages for delegates may be left at the ESCP registration desk during opening hours. Messages will be displayed on the message board located in the registration area.

PRAGUE

Prague is the capital city of the Czech Republic and the most precious Czech historical city site. It came into existence as a town when after 870 Prague Castle was built. It is a beautifully preserved city with amazing architecture and great scale of stunning old buildings, winding streets and famous sights such as Charles Bridge, Old Town Square, Prague Castle, etc. In 1992 the historical core of the city covering 866 hectares was listed in the UNESCO World Cultural and Natural Heritage Register. Prague has a fascination that almost amounts to enchantment. Added to that, the people are welcoming and charming. This city was under communism for over 40 year and seldom visited by tourists until after 1989. Then the Velvet Revolution of 17th November changed everything - this date is now a Czech Republic public holiday.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT IN PRAGUE

Metro, trams and buses: the metro operates from 05:00 to midnight each day, and trams and buses operate from 04:30 - 00:15. Tickets must be validated (stamped) at the beginning of your journey; this is done inside the tram/bus, or if using the metro station at the entrance. Tickets may be purchased in advance by using automated machines or ticket offices.

A map of the tram and metro network is provided in your delegate bag and further supplies are available at registration. Metro, tram and bus single tickets cost €1 and last for 75 minutes. A 24-hour ticket costs €4. Three to five day tickets range in price between €13-20.

Travel back to the airport: Prague Airport, Ruzyne is located 17km from the city centre, a taxi will cost approximately €19 (slightly more if your hotel is further out) and will take 25 minutes depending on the time of day and traffic volume. The taxi prices from the airport are regulated by airport administration. Be aware that Prague taxi drivers may try to take advantage of tourists.

Public transport to the airport is by metro and bus: take the Airport Express bus which runs directly from Hlavni Nadrazi Metro station (line C, direction Letnany). The bus operates from 05:00 - 22:00 each day, a €1 metro ticket covers the journey in total if completed within 75 minutes. Allow at least 40 minutes for your journey from central Prague.

Prague's main railway (Hlavni) provides international and national trains. Local trains depart from Masarykovo, Vysocanske and Smichov Stations. For rail information call +420 840 112 113.

Thursday: Accompanying Persons Walking Grand Tour of Prague 10:00 - 15:00

Included in the Accompanying Persons registration fee, includes lunch.

This insightful historical tour lets you enjoy the city's most famous sights. The tour starts at Prague Castle (Hradčany), registered, continuing on foot on the "Royal Route" winding down to Lesser Town and picturesque Kampa Island, crossing the famous Charles Bridge, continuing on to the Old Town. Lunch is included at a local restaurant. Sturdy comfortable **walking shoes** are recommended for this tour, together with a waterproof in case of rain.

Friday Tour A: visit to Konopiste Castle & Gardens with lunch 10:00 - 15:00

€80 per person includes transportation, English speaking guide, fees and lunch

Konopiste Castle (Zámek Konopiště) was founded at the end of 13th century. Originally built in French Gothic style, it was later rebuilt into a Baroque chateau by the Vrtbas. Its current appearance is a result of the last renovations made by Archduke Franz Ferdinand d'Este, the successor to the Austro-Hungarian throne, who bought the castle from the Lobkowitzs in 1887.

Before his assassination in 1914 (which started World War I), Ferdinand lived in Konopiste and gathered a large collection of hunting trophies, weapons, antique furniture, paintings, tapestry and other art objects. This collection is now the main attraction of the castle. There will be time to visit the delightful rose garden, before going on to "Hlinena basta" restaurant (www.hlinenabasta.cz), an informal Czech restaurant located in Bohemian countryside just outside Prague, specialising in seafood and steak. Returning by coach to central Prague hotels, coaches will drop off at main central hotels.



Saturday Tour A: visit to Nelahozeves Castle with wine tasting and dinner 14:00 - 21:00

€125 includes transportation, English speaking guide, entrance fees, wine tasting and dinner

Enjoy the fascinating Nelahozeves Castle, home of composer Antonín Dvorak, which represents the pinnacle of Renaissance Bohemian architecture. Completed in the late 1500's, the exterior facades are almost completely preserved as are many interiors; exhibits of Mozart and Beethoven's musical instruments and original scores are included, together with the largest private art collection in the world - all in all, this is an exceptionally rare collection that should not be missed!

This fine Renaissance collection includes the Knight's Hall with its stone fireplace, wall and ceiling paintings. Enjoy viewing the medieval reliquaries, a collection of European art, furniture, ceramics, rare books, and musical artefacts. The paintings in the Castle's gallery belong to such artists as Rubens, Bruegel the Elder, Canaletto, Velasquez, and Veronese. This amazing gallery features one of the largest collections of Spanish portraits from the 16th and 17th centuries outside of Spain.

After time to take in this amazing place, we will have a wine tasting, followed by dinner in the Salonek Restaurant within the castle itself. Buses will return to Prague, dropping off at main hotels.

Friday or Saturday Tour B: Prague boat trip with lunch 11:00 - 14:00 Friday and 14:00 - 17:00

€45 - includes transportation, lunch, entertainment & English speaking guide

This tour offers the opportunity to explore enchanted Prague by boat. The river cruise allows you to discover some of the city's major monuments and sights, such as the National Theatre, Prague Castle and Charles Bridge, while relaxing over lunch (Friday) or afternoon tea (Saturday).

ESCP Annual General Meeting & Special Resolutions Saturday 26 September: 12:30 - 13:30 : Forum Hall

ESCP kindly request that members attend this important meeting. 2009 "Regular Members" (Europe) and 2009 "Voting Members" (outside Europe) only are eligible to vote, but all are welcome to attend. An agenda is on display in the registration area, together with a list of currently subscribed members. Please check the list if you are in doubt about your membership status, you may update this if you wish at the Membership Desk located opposite the main registration desk.

IMPORTANT: an **Annual Meeting Ticket** is included in your registration pack; please bring this with you to the meeting, they will be collected as a record of your attendance.

Proposed Articles and Memorandum of Association: in 2005 when ECCP and EACP merged to become ESCP, a new Constitution was created in an Austrian legal format. This presented difficulties as it had also been agreed that the existing EACP financial infrastructure and Secretariat would provide the most stable basis for the new organization. The EACP infrastructure was established within the UK and therefore was (and is) required to comply with UK banking, charity and legal company reporting regulations.

After external legal and financial advice and much consideration by the ESCP Council and the Executive, it was resolved in 2008 to amend the existing UK legal documentation

to reflect those characteristics of the Austrian Constitution that are essential to the aims and objectives of ESCP. This decision was reported to the ESCP Annual General Meeting in September 2008. As it had not been possible to provide sufficient notification of the amendments, ratification of the proposed amendments, as recommended by the Executive and Council, was deferred to September 2009. The proposed changes will be presented for approval by the AGM on Saturday 26 September at the Prague Congress Centre.

ESCP MEMBERSHIP

Membership Structure: Regular membership is available either to members resident in Europe, or to voting members from outside Europe, in each case, being registered physicians who have a demonstrable interest in coloproctology.

Regular members need the support of two other regular members. Full (regular) members are European residents with full voting rights and may be elected for office. (regular) voting members are from outside Europe with full voting rights but may not be elected to office.

Membership is available to Trainee Members (those in training appointments), to Affiliate Members who are not medically qualified (technicians, nurses and scientists) working in the field of coloproctology, or to Corporate Members within organizations who have an interest in coloproctology. These membership types do not have the right to vote or to be elected to office.

ON-LINE MEMBERSHIP

In 2007, ESCP began to handle membership payments online in order to make the process of membership payments much more straightforward. If you have completed membership this year and paid by credit card, membership for 2010 will automatically be processed in December, and we will notify you by e-mail at that time.

If you have not yet joined ESCP, we invite you to consider doing so!

The Society needs the support of its members in order to cover administrative costs, and to guarantee a stable base from which to organise stimulating and advancing congresses into the future. There are internet points near the registration desk where you can complete membership.
