



The prize will be presented by Chairman Neil Mortensen on Thursday afternoon. ## ACCOMPANYING PERSONS

The Accompanying Persons' registration fee covers attendance to the welcome reception on Thursday evening and a walking tour of Sorrento on Thursday departing at 09:00 from the Hilton Sorrento Palace Hotel Conference Centre entrance (not the hotel lobby entrance).

#### **PUBLIC TRANSPORT**

#### Public transport options on departure:

A public bus service operates from Sorrento's rail station; the journey time is approximately 1.5 hours and the bus makes several stops en route. **Spaces are limited** and you are advised that if you plan to use this service, you allow plenty of time. **We** strongly recommend that you consider using the ESCP Shuttle which is non-stop, in order to ensure you have a seat and can reach the airport on time.

Public buses depart Sorrento at: 06:30, 08:30, 09:00, 10.30, 12.00, 14.00, 15.00 and 16.30

**Trains** operate from Sorrento station into central Naples, taking 60-75 minutes at a cost of approx. €3 and onwards to the airport by taxi (a further 20 minutes) at a cost of €30 approx.

There are at least 2 trains per hour during the day, more during rush-hour; for a detailed timetable please ask at Registration.

**The Hydrofoil** leaves Sorrento harbour to Naples port during the day at 07.20, 08:10, 09:45, 12:00, 13.40, 16.25 and 18.50. The cost is approximately €11 each way.

#### **ABOUT SORRENTO**

## Sorrento, a city of orange and lemon groves, changes colour from season to season and is a delight to explore!



Sorrento

Although the city lacks a long stretch of beachfront, there are a number of beaches around Sorrento's marinas, such as the Marina Piccola and Marina Grande. However, there are plenty of glorious beaches close by and the views across the Bay of Naples are outstanding, with Mount Vesuvius being visible in the distance. For some of the very best coastal views imaginable, take a stroll along the Via San Francesco until you reach the Villa Comunale Park. Alternatively, you can always take a bus trip along the very scenic Amalfi Coast, or enjoy a family orientated sightseeing 'City Train' ride, which comes complete with multi-language audio guides.



The historical centre of Sorrento

One of the oldest landmarks in the city is without doubt the Duomo (Cathedral), which dominates the Sorrento skyline and stands proudly along the Corso Italia. Located on the Piazza San Antonio, the Basilica di San Antonino is another eye-catcher, as is the 15th-century Sedil Dominova, and the Villa Comunale's Chiesa di San Francesco, which is famed for its resplendent 14th century cloisters. Alternatively, pay a visit to the Piazza della Vittoria, which is close to the Marina Grande and whilst the views of Sorrento's bayfront here may not quite rival those from the Villa Comunale, they are still rather special and well worth savouring.

Although visitors may not really come to Sorrento for any other reason than its accessible beaches and coastline, the city is home to some rather noteworthy museums, offering information about a number of different subject matters, including geology, archaeology and general history. The Museo Correale di Terranova at the Palazzo Correale is especially popular in Sorrento and also features some rather beautiful gardens, while the ancient Etruscan treasures within the Antiquarium Aequano are a real treat and date back to before the 1st century. For top quality art galleries, nearby Naples is the place to head for.

Many tourists holidaying in Sorrento choose to take day trips to the innumerable attractions which lie close by. In the summer, the Marina Piccola turns into a hub of maritime activities, with both hydrofoils and ferries speeding off to coastal destinations such as Amalfi, Naples, Positano, and the islands of Capri and Ischia. For something quite different, the historic remains at Pompeii are a spectacular attraction, with temples, theatres, Roman baths and much more besides, all of which were well preserved in the ashes of Mount Vesuvius when it erupted over Pompeii almost 2,000 years ago.

**David Beck** is Chairman of the Department of Colon and Rectal Surgery at the Ochsner Clinic Foundation in New Orleans, Louisiana, USA and President of the American Society of Colon and Rectal Surgeons. Dr. Beck has authored and edited seven medical textbooks, over 100 book chapters and over 150 peer reviewed articles. He is also on the faculty at the Louisiana State University, the Uniformed Services University, and the University of Quensland. Dr. Beck is a nationally recognized expert in inflammatory bowel disease, cancer, stomas, adhesions, bowel preparation, endoscopy, and laparoscopic surgery.

After training in general surgery, **Alexander Engel** spent a year at St Marks' Hospital in London and started as a consultant in 1994 in a teaching hospital. He runs a coloproctology service, including endoscopy and anorectal endosonography/physiology. He is committed to clinical research, and his main interests are: risk management in colorectal surgery, long term functional outcome of anal surgery and tumour and patient profiling in colorectal cancer. He is actively involved in the ESCP Scientific Committee, and represents ESCP at the UEGF Council, he also examines for EBSQ in coloproctology.

**Fabrizio Michelassi,** the Lewis Atterbury Stimson Professor of Surgery and Chairman of the Department of Surgery at Weill Cornell Medical College and Surgeon-in-Chief at the NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital/Weill Cornell Medical Center, is a gastrointestinal surgeon with expertise in the surgical treatment of gastrointestinal cancers and inflammatory bowel disease.

His experience and expertise in treating Crohn's disease led him to develop a novel bowel-sparing procedure, now known as the Michelassi strictureplasty. He has edited a book on operative strategies in inflammatory bowel disease and has produced many motion pictures on the surgical treatment of complications of Crohn's disease.

Internationally renowned as an outstanding clinician, researcher and teacher, Michelassi has delivered many named and keynote lectures around the world; he has been invited to be a visiting professor at 32 national and international institutions and has delivered over 180 national and international presentations. He is on the editorial board of five prestigious medical journals including: the Journal of Gastrointestinal Surgery, the British Journal of Surgery, the World Journal of Gastroenterology, and Annals of Surgery. He currently serves as Secretary of the Society of the Alimentary Tract and has served as Vice-President of the International Society of Digestive Surgery.

**Eric Rullier** is a General Surgeon at the University of Bordeaux in France in 1991. As a colorectal surgeon at Saint-Andre Hospital in Bordeaux, he developed clinical research in rectal cancer. He became Professor of Surgery in 2001 and received the Chair of Colorectal Surgery at the University of Bordeaux. In 2005, he founded the French Surgical Group of Rectal Cancer Research and developed multicenter randomized trials. He is an active member of the ESCP. His scientific production includes more than 50 English publications and 300 conferences all in rectal cancer surgery. He is Director of European Workshops for Education in Laparoscopic TME.

**Bruce G. Wolff** is a Professor of Surgery, Mayo Medical School, and Chairman of the Division of Colon and Rectal Surgery, Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minnesota. Dr. Wolff was born in Columbus, Georgia and received his undergraduate degree from Davidson College. He earned his M.D. degree from Duke University School of Medicine in Durham, North Carolina. He served as an intern in anaesthesia at Duke Medical Center and then completed a general surgical and residency at New York Hospital - Cornell Medical Center. He served for two years as a U.S. Army physician. After completing his general surgery training, he received his fellowship training in Colon and Rectal Surgery at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. He then joined the staff at the Mayo Clinic.

Dr. Wolff has authored or co-authored over 270 publications. He is a member of multiple medical societies and is a Past President of the American Society of Colon and Rectal Surgeons and the American Board of Colon and Rectal Surgeons. Dr. Wolff is an active researcher but still maintains a busy clinical practice in which the management of inflammatory bowel disease plays a major role, in addition to procedures for colorectal cancer. He also has long been involved in resident education, and has been recognized as a surgical subspeciality Teacher of the Year.
